Featured Workshop Presentations:



Trauma Informed Treatment Guidelines for Latin American Asylum Seekers in Mental Health Clinical Settings by Rosa Maria Bramble, LCSW-R

Among recent immigrants there is a large number of asylum seekers seeking refuge in the United States as the result of socio political and violence in Latin America. The workshop will address three main groups: Unaccompanied children from Central America, Venezuelan asylum seekers and women fleeing gender based violence. Their journey as well as their settlement in the U.S. is traumatizing, thus it is essential for social workers to gain an understanding of their plight, tools and resources to better serve this population in mental health settings.



Therapeutic Implication When Working with Latino Immigrant Youth and their Families by Vilma E. Matos, LCSW-R

This workshop reviews the actual month long, perilous journey many of the unaccompanied Central American youth undertake to get to this country. Once here, they have to reconnect with parents and siblings they have not seen in years or have never met. This often results in family upheaval and discord. Reunification is then compounded with culture shock, learning English, and attending a new school with its unfamiliar system and rules.



The Next Chapter for Latinx Social Workers: Moving Beyond Culturally Competent to Anti-Racism Practice by Brian Romero, LMSW and Jennie Encalada, MSW



The aim of this workshop will be to educate Latinx social workers and social workers working in Latinx communities about the need to address a macro component of practice often left out of even social work school curricula: structural racism. Cultural competency has often been promoted to be a hallmark of best practice in the social work profession and while this is certainly helpful, we must ask ourselves what is missing from the equation? The media and the presidential election continue to shed light on racism via police brutality, mass incarceration, immigration and other foreign policy issues. A collaborative exercise will be facilitated in order for participants to examine power, privilege and points of oppression across identities, which are omnipresent in the social worker – client relationship.
